What does CCIE entail?

- ✓ Collaboration: Educators, partners, stakeholders, communities working together, sharing expertise, perspectives, and resources.
- ✓ Continuous Improvement: norms and routines foster a culture of learning and innovation, committed to ongoing growth and improvement for the benefit of all.
- ✓ Evidence-Informed and Iterative: learning from results through continuous cycles of planning, implementing, analyzing, reflecting.
- ✓ User-Focused: Understand and serve the needs of people closest to the problem, or end-users of designs for change.
- ✓ Shared Leadership: Leadership is distributed among educators, empowering them to take ownership of the improvement process.

Improvement Science	Improve processes, practices, and outcomes.	Real-world problem-solving in systems.	Iterative cycles (Plan-Do-Study-Act)	Collaboration, scalability, measurable impact.
Implementation Science	Bridge the gap between research and practice.	Adoption and sustainability of practices.	Identify barriers, apply implementation frameworks.	Contextual relevance, evidence-based solutions.
Design-Based Research	Advance theory and develop practical solutions.	Innovation in real world settings.	Iterative design and analysis with practitioners.	Theory-practice alignment, usability of solutions.
Design-Based Implementation Research	Align designs with systemic and equity challenges.	Systemic challenges in implementation.	Collaborative, equity-focused design with stakeholders.	Equity, sustainability, scalability.
Community-Based Design Research	Address community-specific needs and priorities.	Local community contexts.	Collaborative design with community members.	Local knowledge, empowerment, co-creation.

CCIE POSTER EXAMPLE

The problem: A 7th grade departmental team notices that students with extensive support needs (ESN) are not accessing grade-level and complex texts in meaningful or supported ways. Instruction varies widely across classrooms, and the team lacks shared routines for supporting such access.

Context

- Large, urban middle school serving culturally and linguistically diverse youth (grades 7-8)
- 12 ESN students served in fully inclusive classrooms for all common core classes
 - 7 students are non-speaking; use some form of augmrntative or alternative communication device or system
 - 5 students are emerging readers
 - 4 students read at a 2nd grade level
 - 3 students read at 7th grade level, but comprehension is a struggle

Improving

What they are Improving: Access to complex texts for students with ESN across common core subjects

How they are Improving it: PDSA cycles on selected strategies (Text chunking, AAC supports, graphic organizers)

Challenges

Practical

- Limited common planning time
- Para schedules prevent consistent participation

Technical

- Teachers unevenly trained in supporting students w/ ESN
- Difficulty adapting curriculum for students w/ESN
- Limited comfort with AAC

Cultural

- Differing beliefs teaching students with ESN in inclusive classrooms; their ability to achieve.
- Some staff see literacy supports as "SPED work" instead of shared work

Overcoming

- Protected co-planning time
- Align supports across subjects
- Training for staff (e.g., supprts, AAC, UDL)
- Inclusive vision & communication
- Identify what is working

Bridging

Design-Based Implementation Research

- Cross-subject instructional coherence
- Equity-focused redesign of learning
- Sustained collaboration among the team
- System-level barriers (scheduling, PLC norms, expectations)
